

From the Rector's Desk

A half sunny and half windy-promise of rain day as I look out of my office window North, towards the Heartland, whilst Henry snores gently in his basket. I have been working today on the new storytelling training module and our Mission Action Plan, only stopping to take an interment at St Peter & James for a much-loved man. I have also been updating our Bereavement, Grief & Loss training program, by chance, and am reminded how much our life story is impacted by loss. Grief is a natural part of life but it is never easy. Psychologists have known for some time that grief is the biggest, single impact factors of how we tell our own stories, impact or neurological program, and form our old, and new identities: In short, Grief and loss are foundation drivers for who we are.

There were a lot of you who could not attend the fully booked Bereavement training day last year, and I have been asked if I would run it again. Having consulted, we are looking at a day with a lunch at a pub/conference centre on the 8th October 10am to 3pm. I intend to keep costs down so will seek funds to cover the cost of the course. Numbers will be restricted as last year so do book early.

This is not a counselling course, nor will you be asked to be part of a Benefice bereavement team. This is an evidenced-based course to explain what happens to us when we lose someone we love, and to help us help others who travel the same journey.



Solving Burial Mysteries

It's a genealogist's dream to be able to walk into a churchyard and find a distant relative, or a common surname stretching across the generations. At the same time, it's the clergy's nightmare to walk into a church and find missing or incomplete records!

This month, I haven't had the time to do a detailed look into the life of someone in the benefice who may only be remembered by their gravestone. I have had the time, though, to wander through my local churchyard at Halwill, enjoying the calm and solace there.

Walking into the churchyard, there is an oft-hidden-by-grass simple cube with flower holder; a monument simply to to ERJ from the people of Halwill. Further up is a gravestone which has been sliced in half — no remnants of the name at all. Next to it is a grave whose face has peeled off over the years. Further up again is a stone, laid flat, only has a date of Jan 19, 1876, aged 67 years. And next to the church was a mossy stone, which, upon peeling back the moss, revealed the letters R.L.D, 16, 1847. The family of these people wanted to remember them, and for them to be remembered, and here they are, reduced to unknown letters and numbers.

Whether I'm determined or just plain nosey (up to you to decide!) I wanted to find out who these people were.

The first I investigated was Jan 19 1876 aged 67. With a decent set of burial records, I could look up the year and the age and find out he is Richard SOBY, born 1809, died 19th Jan 1876. A bit of further research showed him being buried near his parents Josias and Charity SOBY, and just across from his brothers Josias and Thomas Durrant SOBY, all buried at Halwill.

Having worked out that mystery, I thought I was unstoppable. Records in hand again, I peered at what I had from the half-a-grave. This one was going to be a bit trickier. Right at the slice, is a round-bottomed number which had to be 8. Then two incomplete circles, so 5's or 3's. They died in 1833, 1835, 1853 or 1855. I needed more information. Again, right on the splice line, it read something-5 or something-3 years. The only one that

fitted the bill was 15-year-old John TALLAMY (recorded as GALLAMY) who

died January 1856; he was the nephew of the Black Torrington TALLAMY family I wrote about a few months back.

Unfortunately, I have no chance with the one with the peeled off frontage; there just isn't enough to guess. But looking at the burial log again, RLD fits 16-year old Richard Lane DOWN, gone almost 180 years and his memory almost lost to a patch of moss.

I needed to consult the old newspaper archives for ERJ. Searching for Halwill deaths, I



stumbled upon news of the death of Mrs. Ethel Rose JACOBS (ERJ) in the Western Times in August 1938. She had suffered a fatal fall from her bicycle and died at Winsford Hospital about a week later. Her cause of death was provided by Doctor Craddock of Holsworthy as "a fractured skull and laceration of the brain." At the time of her fall, she was cycling with her daughter Rhoda, who is buried to the rear of the church in

Halwill.



I think the moral to this story is all mysteries can be investigated, and can often be solved. And a good set of reports and records are utterly invaluable!

Bell News

Black Torrington Primary school children come into church for assembly once a month, and they always ring 'peals' on the Belleplates to make the beginning and end of the service more special.

The last assembly of the summer term was even more special as the tower bells were ringing to welcome them into church. We all watched the ringers ringing for us and then they rang the bells down from their 'up' position to their resting position hanging down.

After Revd Paul had told a Bible story and led the prayers, the real excitement began! The children were shown a table-top working model of how the bells are rung as of course you cannot see the bells from the floor.

Safety is very important when bell ringing, so it was explained that now the bells were hanging down they would just be tolled when the ropes were pulled. Each child had several turns guided by the five tower bell ringers and looked so happy and made such a joyful noise - it must have sounded quite strange outside for all the village to hear! Perhaps we have encouraged some potential tower bell ringers. Then the 'spider' was lowered and the bell ropes secured safely out of reach [only six legs on this spider as we only have six bells].

The children played some rounds and tower bell patterns on the Belleplates in the same pitch as the tower bells to show the ringers how they ring. The ringers' captain, Mr David French, then worked with them playing rounds; it was good to see how well they followed his instruction.



Linda and Shirley, two members of St Mary's Ruby Ringers handbell team also had an exciting day recently, when they attended a 'four-in-hand' event run by the south western region of Handbell Ringers of Great Britain at Clyst St Mary. This involved holding two bells in each hand and learning how to ring them!

After learning how to hold them, we were presented with music, interestingly all arrangements of hymn tunes.

The photograph shows Robert, Jane and John Willis ringing four in hand. They came to introduce us to handbell ringing at our 'Tea and Ring' fundraiser, way back in 2021.



SEASON OF CREATION

The theme for Season of Creation 2024 is 'hope and act with creation'. In Romans 8, Paul writes "22 For we know that all creation has been groaning as in the pains of childbirth right up to the present time"

As people of faith, the state of our world should grieve us. In the UK we live in one of the most <u>nature depleted countries on earth</u>, and currently the decline continues. Across the world extreme weather is increasing frequency and intensity. The Climate Crisis isn't a future issue, it's here now.

But there is reason to hope. In 2015 the <u>emissions gap report</u> predicted warming of over 4°C with the policies of the time. Since then, progress has been made, the 2023 report now predicts (if current policies remain) that we are expecting around 3°C. It's not good enough but it shows that change is possible.

Recently I met the Archbishop of Melanesia, he shared powerfully that Melanesian communities don't need reminding of the climate crisis, they are living with the effects daily. In our privileged world we don't feel the effects as often. We need reminding; we need to remember that as one of the world's wealthiest nations we are responsible for the effects our consumerism has had and is having on some of the poorest people in the world.

In Matthew 25 Jesus says, "I was hungry and you gave me nothing to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, ⁴³ I was a stranger and you did not invite me in, I needed clothes and you did not clothe me, I was sick and in prison and you did not look after me.' ⁴⁴ "They also will answer, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or needing clothes or sick or in prison, and did not help you?' ⁴⁵ "He will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did not do for one of the least of these, you did not do for me.' When we see record breaking storms, sea level rises, drought and desertification do we stop and think, Jesus is there. Do we stop and ask, in what small way have we contributed to this chaos?

We can do better; we are called to do better. The faithful servant was told "You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things." Let's start by being faithful with what we have.

Let's act together in hope for creation.
