NOVEMBER

From the Rector's Desk

I was licensed last night as Rural Dean. It affected me more than I thought it would have, given that I have been doing it for 18 months in an 'Acting Role'. The Archdeacon reminded us at the service that when I began, I was the only full-time priest in the Deanery, but now I have two really special colleagues who together have formed a tight and positive group identity.

18 months seems to have passed in a flash, but on reflection, I fell so much has happened. I am now passed my second batch of APCMs, my second set of Harvest Services (all 13 of them!), and my second year of remembrance and Christmas services all falling due: My first visitation to all 22 churches done and the next booked for Nov. One really large training package on bereavement now complete and the adult evangelism course planned for New Year.

I have sat with people whilst they died, and have mourned alongside friends and family. I have celebrated the most exceptional weddings and incredible Baptisms. Children from four schools say hello now when they meet me out with their parents. Buildings are being saved and new church relationships worked on.

There have also been moments of intense sadness as well; sometimes listening to people who are hurt, or lost in darkness, supporting a child whose rabbit has died taking her world down with it, planning for a church

warden to leave who has become a friend, or watching a much-loved church close and knowing there is nothing I can do about it.

What stays with me on a Sunday night, when I traditionally have a small glass of Whisky at my desk, is the sense of privilege that I feel. In the intensity of living and working in a deeply rural set of parishes where centuries of history are alive, vibrant and real. We face very real change and challenges. Faith here is growing; we are strong, and Christ is with us and in us, but like the communities around us and those whose faith we share from down the years, we are going to need to change quickly, adapt, and find new ways to preach and live the Gospel, but this is a road we will travel together.

Last thought: What I value here in Ruby are the friendships, those who tell hard truths, supportive groups with no-nonsense approaches, small kind emails in the night; the range of different people and different traditions and different approaches, all in community. Every church here is genuinely special and different, like the people who worship in them — I am intensely aware how fortunate I am.



Monthly Reflection from the Ven. Jane Bakker, Archdeacon of Plymouth

As November approaches, we move into a time of remembrance. The month starts with All Saints' Day when we remember, with gratitude, those who have inspired us on our Christian journey. They may be people who are universally acknowledged as saints, but they could equally be just ordinary 'saints' — people living out their Christian faith in simple ways. I imagine that you will immediately know who those people have been for you.

All Souls', in turn, is a chance for us to remember all those who have gone before. All the people we have known and loved (or not) throughout our life; the countless people who have impacted our lives and shaped us into the people we are today.

Inevitably, thinking about those I have lost over the years causes me to think about my own mortality. I approach this in a pragmatic, rather than sentimental, way. What needs to be done? It is always easier to focus on the practical things, like updating a will or arranging a power of attorney. These things are an inevitable part of growing older; they are important and mustn't be put off, but are they really the most significant?

A few years ago, a relative died after a long and difficult illness. When her husband was clearing out her things, he found a letter that started "If you are reading this, I guess I didn't make it..." She went on to tell him about how much she had valued their relationship, coming as it did later in life. Her husband was so upset! He felt he had been robbed of the chance to reply. There were things that he wanted to say to her but had never found the right moment. They had got caught up in a spiral of optimism that wouldn't allow them to admit the inevitable. They had never actually discussed the possibility that she would die. The most important thing for us all to do, whatever our age or health, is to have those conversations. We need to tell those around us what they mean to us and to let them tell us in return. This may be uncomfortable; it may be difficult to find the right time, but it is important and mustn't be put off.

As Christians, we can approach the end of our life with hope and gratitude, knowing that God will welcome us home. In this remembrance season, as we look back with thanksgiving at the Saints and Souls that have gone before, let us also look around us and tell those near what they mean to us. And I pray that God will give us grace to listen when they tell us what we mean to them.
